



State legislative action prompts changes to TRA pensions

On May 19, 2026, the Minnesota governor signed House File 4074, the 2026 Omnibus Pension and Retirement Bill (omnibus pension bill), into law.

This legislation makes slight adjustments to the rules for transitioning into retirement and returning to work as a TRA retiree.

EARNINGS LIMITATION SUSPENSION EXTENDED

TRA retirees who return to work or transition into retirement under a return-to-work agreement generally are subject to a \$46,000 earnings limitation until they reach their Social Security normal retirement age. In 2022, the Minnesota Legislature initially suspended this limitation for TRA-covered employment in PreK–12 schools for two years and extended it in 2024.

In 2025, the TRA Board of Trustees evaluated data and policy options related to retiree reemployment and supported extending the earnings limitation suspension through fiscal year 2030. The omnibus pension bill made this change, and the suspension now applies to salary earned through June 30, 2030.

Retired TRA members employed by Minnesota State under the Annuitant Employment Program remain subject to a \$62,000 annual earnings limitation.

RETURN-TO-WORK AGREEMENTS

In certain circumstances, a TRA member who works in a PreK–12 school is able to transition gradually into retirement by simultaneously collecting a pension and a paycheck. This is done according to a formal return-to-work agreement defining the terms and duration of the retiring member's employment. Importantly, these formalized agreements are the only scenario in which there can be a preexisting understanding that the member will apply for TRA benefits and continue working for a school district.

Additional 2026 legislative changes:

CLARIFIED ELIGIBLE SALARY

Minnesota Paid Leave program payments are not eligible salary for pension purposes.

PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS

The list of medical providers who can submit documentation with respect to TRA disability benefits now includes physician assistants.

EMPLOYER CONTRIBUTIONS

Beginning July 1, employers will make pension contributions on the eligible salary earned by reemployed TRA annuitants.

INTEREST ASSUMPTION

The assumption used to calculate joint-and-survivor benefits was moved out of statute and into an appendix overseen by the Legislative Commission on Pensions and Retirement (LCPR). This enables TRA to use a more custom assumption if recommended by our actuary and approved by the LCPR.

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PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Goals and initiatives at TRA

For many of us, the spring and summer seasons are times of renewal. Daily schedules may have a different rhythm, the longer days can offer a natural boost of energy, and spending more time outdoors often feels rejuvenating.

At TRA, these months are marked by several important, energizing initiatives—each enhancing how the fund serves its members and fulfills its mission.

As you will read on page 1, the 2026 Omnibus Pension and Retirement Bill became law in May. This year's legislative updates were multifaceted, improving the process for active members to apply for disability benefits, extending the earnings limitation suspension for PreK–12 educators, and lowering the minimum age for members to enter return-to-work agreements with their employers, among other changes. I would like to express my gratitude to the TRA staff who worked diligently to adjust the fund's processes and documentation to align with new legislative requirements. Their swift action ensures that TRA administers the pension plan with precision.

TRA is also in the midst of preparing for operational changes prompted by the board of trustees' decision to require a 90-day break in service for TRA retirees seeking to return to a TRA-eligible position after their formal retirement. This change will bring TRA into better compliance with federal tax law and will be effective January 1, 2027. TRA is engaged in informing both members and their employers about the forthcoming requirement to facilitate a smooth transition.

Also looking to the future, the board of trustees will continue its strategic planning initiative this summer and beyond. The board discussed the early phases of a strategic plan project several times recently and then at our June board meeting heard presentations from consulting firms that partner with public entities like TRA on governance and goal setting.

We anticipate that pairing an outside perspective with the insights of trustees and TRA's executive leadership team will facilitate a plan with an enduring positive influence.

To close, I want to highlight areas of innovation that are underway for the fund. TRA launched a redesigned website this April. While there is an overview of the site's enhancements on page 4, I encourage you to visit minnesotatra.org for yourself to find a number of new resources, see its contemporary branding, and review its revised content. In several different capacities, TRA is updating its tools and communications to meet or exceed accessibility standards and to better support our stakeholders. As always, TRA and its leadership remain committed to delivering a high quality experience for all of our members.

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Previously, eligibility for return-to-work agreements was limited to those aged 62 and older. The omnibus pension bill lowered the eligibility age for these agreements from age 62 to age 59 1/2. Individuals must be at least 59 1/2 years old when they receive their first TRA pension check and are employed under a return-to-work agreement.

The TRA Board of Trustees supported reducing the age to better align with TRA's 60-and-30 benefit structure, which became effective in 2025. Under that benefit, eligible members who are age 60 or older with at least 30 years of service credit may qualify for more favorable reduction factors for early retirement under the Level formula.

TRA members employed by Minnesota State have a different postretirement employment option. This was not affected by the new legislation.

Share your power of attorney details with TRA

If you have a power of attorney, submit the information to TRA so that it can be noted on your member account. This ensures that if you reach a point where you are no longer able to manage your own financial transactions, the individual(s) to whom you've delegated authority may act on your behalf.

To designate a power of attorney, you must submit a power of attorney cover

letter and Minnesota statutory short form to TRA. The form must be either the original or a certified copy of the original.
